Our hope is that the information shared in this newsletter will help residents connect their family, friends and neighbors with resources that could help them overcome addiction and save lives. We all have a part to play in creating a beloved community where neighbors look out for other neighbors.



Overdose Deaths on the Rise in Ward 15

In a July 2023 report, Alex Dorman, a Ward 15 resident and Research Fellow with The Center for Community Solutions, described a rising epidemic in Cuyahoga County. "We are on track to suffer a record number of overdose deaths in 2023. A projected 770 neighbors, friends, and family members will lose their lives to an overdose in Cuyahoga County this year. This is up from the previous record of over 720 overdose deaths in 2017," wrote Dorman.

Per Dorman's report, one clear reason for the dramatic increase in overdose deaths is the proliferation of fentanyl (a synthetic opioid roughly fifty to one hundred times more potent than heroin) in all kinds of street drugs, including heroin, cocaine, methamphetamine, marijuana, and fake pills pressed to look like commonly abused prescriptions, such as Adderall.

It may surprise many residents to learn that Ward 15 has a high rate of overdoses and overdose deaths, relative to other parts of the city. According to Cleveland's Division of **Emergency Medical Service** (EMS), the 44109 and 44102 ZIP codes have the highest rates of Naloxone administration. Naloxone - commonly known as Narcan - is used to reverse an opioid overdose by restoring breathing. Data provided by Cuyahoga **County Medical Examiner** and analyzed by the Case Western Reserve University Begun Center for Violence



Prevention Research and Education reported that 183 residents have died in Ward 15 from a drug

City of Cleveland Police & Public Safety Recruitment

On August 23rd, Mayor Justin M. Bibb announced an agreement that will provide a 50% pay increase and up to a \$5,000 sign-on bonus for new police cadets.

Under the new agreement trainees going through the Cleveland Police Academy will now make approximately \$24/ hour – up 50% from the previous pay rate of \$16/hour. The new rate elevates the City above several of its peers, surpassing the City of Cincinnati (\$19.75/ hour) and the Ohio State Highway Patrol (\$22/hour), among others.

The agreement also includes marked improvements for officers entering the force with a four-year college degree, prior military experience, or previous OPOTA certification. Officers with a Bachelor's or higher academic degree, and those who have served 180 consecutive days or more on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces and were honorably discharged, will attain an elevated rank upon

being sworn in - equating to approximately a \$3,700 year one wage enhancement under this new agreement. Trainees who paid for and received previous OPOTA certification will also receive payment to reimburse course costs.

These investments follow an 11% raise in officers' salaries approved by Cleveland City Council last year – the largest in the City's modern history - and are part of Mayor Bibb's RISE Initiative

announced in July.

Active recruitment is also underway for other Public Safety divisions at the City of Cleveland, including EMS, Fire and Animal Care & Control. Recently, the Cleveland EMS union was the first to sign an agreement for 12 weeks of paid parental leave, matching non-union employee benefits.

What residents can do

If you or someone you know is using drugs, you can help to prevent an overdose by:

- Testing drugs for fentanyl with test strips
- · Don't use drugs while you are alone
- Carrying Naloxone

MetroHealth's Office of Opioid Safety (www.metrohealth.org/office-of-opioidsafety) includes a listing of Project DAWN locations where people can get free Naloxone, including McCafferty Health Center (4242 Lorain Ave.) and the office of Cleveland EMS (1701 Lakeside Ave.). There

are also multiple vending machines throughout Cuyahoga County with free Naloxone kits, including one at The Centers at 5209 Detroit Ave. In addition, a growing number of bars and clubs offer free fentanyl test strips. Thrive for Change, a local non-profit dedicated to education and the

distribution of life-saving supplies, offers both free Naloxone and fentanyl strips: thrive4change.org.

Longer term solutions On a warm summer evening on Friday, August 18th, Renee Jones, founder of the Renee Jones Empowerment Center (RJEC) set up Project Red

Cord (PRC) at 5:00pm at the corner of Lorain Avenue and West 73rd Street which is a recurring Night Out location. Although PRC's mission is to assist victims of human trafficking, other related social service agencies and volunteers join Jones to address needs that commonly accompany this issue, including substance abuse and domestic violence.

By 5:46pm, over 100 people had stopped by. Eighty (80) hot meals that were prepared in the homes of volunteers were distributed and Renee handed out 60 bags with daily, personal hygiene items - the items that many of us take for granted.

Says Renee, "Project Red Cord Night out on Lorain Avenue gives us the opportunity first to give hope to those who are on the street, some suffering from being victims of human trafficking and being addicted to drugs because these two things go hand in hand... When we arrived, there was a young woman high on drugs laying on the ground. We began to set up our outreach tables and told her we have many things there to assist her from food to

personal care items to getting help with addiction. By the time all of the resource tables were set-up she stood up and began to visit each table. She was able to enjoy a delicious meal, stop by our mobile medical clinic and visited all the other resource agencies and ended her visit by stopping at our self care station getting a quote on a sticky note to inspire her. She left that street corner with hope which is what this outreach is all about!"

Four additional PRC Night Out events are scheduled in 2023: on September 29, October 27, November 10 and December 15.



Project White Butterfly, which provided many referrals during PRC's Night Out, directs anyone who is ready to stop using opioids to call Project SOAR (available 24 hours) at (440) 502-0020. SOAR is a collaborative effort that includes partnerships between the Woodrow Project

and the Alcohol, Drug Addiction & Mental Health Services (ADAMHS) Board of Cuyahoga County, Cleveland Clinic, and multiple municipalities.

For families or friends of someone addicted to opioids, the ADAMHS Board of Cuyahoga County provides local facts, information and resources for taking the first steps in helping someone address substance abuse. Go to bit.ly/ADAMHSOpioidHelp for details.

Councilmember Spencer Announces \$1M Habitat for Humanity Investment



Councilmember Jenny Spencer is proud to announce that \$1M in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars will be invested in Ward 15 through Habitat for Humanity. As a result, ten (10) new single family homes will be built that will be affordable to families earning between 30-80% of Area Median Income. The exact sites for the homes have not yet been selected.

Councilmember Spencer was the leading Council member for the Habitat legislation, a total \$5M ARPA investment across five city wards. In addition, the City of Cleveland has allocated \$1.5M in funding to Habitat for critical home repairs.

"I was elated to get the Habitat legislation

across the finish line," said Spencer. "In addition to the ten houses that will be built in Ward 15, what I'm most excited about is Habitat's model that includes home repairs in the surrounding area. Whether minor home repairs ("spruce ups") or critical home repairs - dozens of additional Ward 15 families will benefit from these dollars."

In addition, says Spencer, "I plan to work with Habitat to ensure that many of these homes are single story, so occupants can age comfortably in their homes." More information about the Habitat process will be shared in upcoming editions of this newsletter and on Councilmember Spencer's social media.

Council Office Tackles Dumping Thanks to Help from CCS

Dumping in alleyways, street corridors and vacant lots is one of the most frequent complaints received by the Council office. Ward 15 Executive Assistant Joseph Naser works with Court Community Service (CCS) to address dumping sites as quickly as possible.

Founded in 1985, CCS is a not-for-profit agency that places individuals referred by courts, who have been sentenced to perform community service hours. Some of the over 4,000 individuals referred to CCS each year fulfill their community service requirements on one of the CCS supervised community service work crews, while others are assigned to assist at local charitable organizations.

"We truly value our relationship with the Ward 15 Council office," says CCS Executive Director Paul Klodor. "CCS is proud of the positive impact our work crews have in the community, and working collaboratively helps us to address issues quickly and effectively."

The following are some commonsense approaches to keeping your vehicle safe (source: Cleveland Division of Police):

- Most thefts occur because a driver simply leaves the keys inside. • If a secure garage is available, utilize it!
- Do not leave ANYTHING of value in plain sight, especially things like purses/bags/ computers/phones. Put everything in

the trunk. Even things like loose change and phone chargers should be put in a compartment. You would be surprised at how many reports of break ins result in just change stolen.

- Secure your vehicle, and double and triple check that it is secure.
- Obtain and use a steering wheel locking device, such as The Club.
- Park in a well-lit area of a parking lot or street. If a streetlight is out, notify the city to have it fixed at 621-5483 (621-LITE).
- If you can block a vehicle in a yard, do so.
- Consider installing cameras and putting signage up on your property that draws attention to the camera's presence.
- Get to know your neighbors and be on the lookout for each other!

2023 Senior of the Year: Elham Baddour

Each Spring, the Council office is asked by the Department of Aging to nominate one resident as our Ward's Senior of the Year. This year's deserving honoree is Ms. Elham Baddour. We are proud to share Elham's story and her lifelong examples of positivity that are making our community a wonderful place to call home.

Born in Lebanon, Elham first came to the US in 1974 to visit her sister in Michigan. In 1975, the Lebanese Civil War broke out and Elham was unable to return home. In 1978, with no end to the war in sight, she moved to Cleveland to live with her brother. She then started a family of her own and raised her three sons in the Cudell

Elham first became involved in the community with her ex-husband, Faouzi, who was a Crime Watch member. They got to know former Councilman Jay Westbrook very well through their work and she is still close friends with

A passionate gardener, Elham not only tends to the many magnificent flowers in her yard, but she also plants seeds of positivity in the minds and hearts of youth. She believes that the teens in her neighborhood need guidance and someone to listen, so in her guiet way, she offers words of encouragement and gestures of kindness to help set them on a better life path.

Elham's mission is especially remarkable because in August 2021, she became a victim of a tragic gun violence incident involving several teenagers. She was gardening in her front yard when she was sadly caught in crossfire and sustained several gunshot wounds. She has endured a very long recovery, and she is still suffering from complications due to her injuries, yet Elham believes in practicing forgiveness. She continues to love her community and remains deeply grateful for her family and neighbors. Elham is both a true survivor and a beacon for all that is beautiful in her neighborhood.
