FIRST READING EMERGENCY ORDINANCES REFERRED

Ord. No. 1678-11.

By Council Members Cimperman, Miller, Cleveland and Sweeney (by departmental request).

An emergency ordinance authorizing the Director of Capital Projects to issue a permit to LDC James LLC to encroach into the public right-of-way of Euclid Avenue by installing, using, and maintaining storefront bay windows.

Whereas, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Cleveland:

Section 1. That the Director of Capital Projects is authorized to issue a permit, revocable at the will of Council, to LDC James LLC, 28045 Ranney Parkway, Suite E, Westlake, Ohio 44145 ("Permittee"), to encroach into the public right-of-way of Euclid Avenue by installing, using, and maintaining storefront bay windows at the following location:

Situated in the City of Cleveland, County of Cuyahoga and State of Ohio and known as being a part of Original 10 Acre Lot No. 53 and further bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a 3/4" pin in a monument box, marking the intersection of the centerline of Euclid Avenue (99' wide) with the centerline of E. 18th Street (66' wide);

Thence South 00 degrees 08 minutes 45 seconds West along the centerline of said E. 18th Street, a distance of 49.50 feet to a point;

Thence South 89 degrees 47 minutes 45 seconds East, along the Southerly right of way line of Euclid Avenue, a distance of 165.43 feet to the Northwesterly corner of said Lot 53 and the principal place of beginning, said corner also being the Northwesterly corner of a parcel of land conveyed to LDC James LLC by deed recorded in AFN 201103300301 of Cuyahoga County Records Records;

Thence North 00 degrees 08 minutes 45 seconds East, a distance of 1.00 feet to a point;

Thence South 89 degrees 47 minutes 45 seconds East parallel with the Southerly right of way line of Euclid Avenue, a distance of 93.77 feet to a point,

Thence South 00 degrees 08 minutes 45 seconds West, a distance of 1.00 feet to a point on the Southerly right of way line of Euclid Avenue, said point being the Northeasterly corner of said land conveyed;

Thence North 89 degrees 47 minutes 45 seconds West along said Southerly right of way line, a distance of 93.77 feet to the principal place of beginning and containing 93.77 Square Feet, of land according to a survey by George A. Hofmann, Registered Surveyor No. 6752.

The basis of bearing is the centerline of Euclid Avenue bearing South 89 degrees 47 minutes 45 seconds East. The courses used in this description are used to indicate angles only. Distances are given in feet and decimal parts thereof.

Legal Description approved by Greg Esber, Section Chief, Plats, Surveys and House Numbering Section.

Section 2. That Permittee may assign the permit only with the prior written consent of the Director of Capital Projects. That the encroaching structure(s) permitted by this ordinance shall conform to plans and specifications approved by the Manager of Engineering and Construction. That Permittee shall obtain all other required permits, including but not limited to Building Permits, for the encroachment(s).

Section 3. That the Director of Law shall prepare the permit authorized by this ordinance and shall incorporate such additional provisions as the director determines necessary to protect and benefit the public interest. The permit shall be issued only when, in the opinion of the Director of Law, Permittee has properly indemnified the City against any loss that may result from the encroachment(s) permitted.

Section 4. That the permit shall reserve to the City reasonable right of entry to the encroachment location(s).

Section 5. That this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and, provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Ord. No. 1680-11.

By Council Members Cimperman, Kelley, Cleveland and Sweeney (by departmental request).

An emergency ordinance determining the method of making the public improvement of improving the civil, mechanical, and electrical systems, replacing the HVAC system, and repairing the roof at 1825 Lakeside Avenue, and for all related work; and

authorizing the Director of Public Utilities to enter into one or more public improvement contracts for the making of the improvement.

Whereas, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Cleveland:

Section 1. That, under Section 167 of the Charter of the City of Cleveland, this Council determines to make the public improvement of improving the civil, mechanical, and electrical systems, replacing the HVAC system, and repairing the roof at 1825 Lakeside Avenue, and for all related work, for the Division of Water, Department of Public Utilities, by one or more contracts duly let to the lowest responsible bidder or bidders after competitive bidding for a gross price for the improvement.

Section 2. That the Director of Public Utilities is authorized to enter into one or more contracts for the making of the public improvement with the lowest responsible bidder or bidders after competitive bidding for a gross price for the improvement, provided, however, that each separate trade and each distinct component part of the improvement may be treated as a separate improvement, and each, or any combination, of the trades or components may be the subject of a separate contract for a gross price. On request of the director, the contractor shall furnish a correct schedule of unit prices, including profit and overhead, for all items constituting units of the improvement.

Section 3. That the Director of Public Utilities is authorized to apply and pay for permits, licenses, or other authorizations required by any regulatory agency or public authority to permit performance of the work authorized by this ordinance.

Section 4. That the cost of the improvement, and other expenditures, authorized shall be paid from Fund Nos. 52 SF 001, 52 SF 229, 52 SF 231, 52 SF 235, from the fund or subfunds which are credited the proceeds of the sale of future waterworks revenue bonds issued for this purpose, and from the funds appropriated in 2012 for this purpose, Request No. RQS 2002, RL 2011-179.

Section 5. That this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and, provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Whereas, under the authority of Ordinance No. 1845-06, passed December 11, 2006, the Director of Port Control entered into Contract No. 67463 with InterVISTAS-ga2 Consulting, Inc. for professional services to provide air service consulting and advising services; and

Whereas, Ordinance No. 1845-06 requires further legislation before exercising the third option to renew on this contract; and

Whereas, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Cleveland:

Section 1. Whereas, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Cleveland:

Section 1. That the Codified Ordinances of Cleveland, Ohio, 1976, are hereby supplemented by enacting new Sections 523.111 and 535.17 thereof to read, respectively, as follows:

Section 523.111 Restoration of Electrical Service

If electrical service has been disconnected at a property for a period of 12 (twelve) consecutive months or more, a customer seeking to have the electrical service restored at that property must obtain written verification from the Director of Building and Housing after inspection of the property by said director or his designee, that such property is in satisfactory condition for resumption of electrical service. Only after receipt of said written verification may the Division of Cleveland Public Power restore electrical service to a property.

Section 535.17 Restoration of Water Service

If water service has been disconnected at a property for a period of 12 (twelve) consecutive months or more, a customer seeking to have the water service restored at that property must obtain written verification from the Director of Building and Housing after inspection of the property by said director or his designee, that such property is in satisfactory condition for resumption of water service. Only after receipt of said written verification may the Division of Water restore water service to a property.

Section 2. That Sections 367.03 and 3103.04 of the Codified Ordinances of Cleveland, Ohio, 1976, as amended by Ordinance Nos. 1075-09 and 1116-A-85, passed August 5, 2009 and February 10, 1986 are hereby amended to read, respectively, as follows:

Section 367.03 Right of Entry

Upon presentation of proper credentials the Director of Building and Housing and his duly authorized agents or inspectors or the Fire Chief or his duly authorized agents or inspectors may enter at reasonable times, or at such other times as may be necessary in an emergency, any dwelling, building, structure or premises in the City to perform any duty imposed on him by this Housing Code or the Fire Code or other relevant section of these Codified Ordinances, provided that permission to enter is obtained from the occupant or, in the case of unoccupied property, from the owner or his agent. If such permission is refused or is otherwise unobtainable, a search warrant shall be obtained before such entry or inspection is made, except in the case of an existing emergency in which case entry may be made at any time and no search warrant is necessary. No person shall in any way obstruct, hinder, delay or otherwise interfere with such entrance under this section.

Section 3103.04 Right of Entry and Inspection

(a) The Commissioner and the Fire Chief or any of their assistants may, at any reasonable hour, enter any dwelling, multifamily dwelling, building, structure or premises within the City to perform any duty imposed on them by OBEC or this Building Code, or the City Housing or Fire Prevention Codes, or other relevant section of these Codified Ordinances, provided that permission to enter is obtained from the occupant or, in the case of unoccupied property, from the owner or his agent. If such permission is refused or is otherwise unobtainable, a search warrant shall be obtained before such entry or inspection is made, except in the case of an existing emergency in which case entry may be made at any time and no search warrant is necessary.

(b) No person shall refuse to permit such emergency entry or inspection, nor shall any person hinder, obstruct, resist or abuse any person making or attempting to make such entry or inspection.

Section 3. That existing Sections 367.03 and 3103.04 of the Codified Ordinances of Cleveland, Ohio, 1976, as amended by Ordinance Nos. 1075-09 and 1116-A-85, passed August 5, 2009 and February 10, 1986 of the Codified Ordinances of Cleveland, Ohio, 1976, are hereby repealed.

Section 4. That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and, provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Section 1. That this ordinance shall be known as the "General Salary Ordinance." Further, that except as otherwise provided, the schedule of compensation set forth in Sections 2 to 58 inclusive, shall be effective as of April 1, 2012, except for Sections 34, 36, 37, 38, 40, and 42, which shall be effective immediately upon the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 2. Secretary to the Mayor, Directors of Departments, Planning Director, Executive Director Community Relations Board, Executive Assistants to the Mayor.

(a) That the salary of the Secretary to the Mayor shall be fixed by the Mayor at not less than \$50,795.78 and not more than \$183,340.00 per annum.

(b) That the salary of the Directors of Law, Finance, Public Utilities, Economic Development, Public Safety, Public Works, Public Health, Personnel and Human Resources, Community Development, Building and Housing, Aging, the Planning Director, the Executive Director of the Community Relations Board, and Executive Assistants to the Mayor shall be fixed by the Mayor at not less than \$50,795.81 and not more than \$176,729.77 per annum.

Said banner shall be approved by the Director of Public Service, in consultation with the Director of Public Safety, as to type, method of affixing and location so as not to interfere with any sign erected and maintained under the requirements of law or ordinance. The permission of the owner of any pole from which a banner will be hung must be obtained prior to issuance of the permit. No commercial advertising shall be printed or permitted on said banner and said banner shall be removed promptly upon the expiration of said permit.
